TEACHER'S OUTLINE

LESSON 4: "America's Superstar"/GRADES 7th - 8th

Key Concept: America's Multimedia Superstar

"He was everywhere," doing radio, writing columns, and giving lectures across the country. As an American superstar, Will Rogers was reaching out to his audience in just about every form of news and entertainment. As one of the country's first social commentators using multimedia, Rogers also entertained through humor, choosing to play roles that reflected his own demeanor and personality. Rogers proved very popular to all walks of American life, from the most powerful to the most in need. He dominated all social media and entertainment fields of his time as the top male film star, top radio commentator and the number one newspaper columnist.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Identify the progression of Will Rogers' career path from the turn of the 20th Century to the mid-1920s.
- 2. Examine the multimedia avenues that Will Rogers pursued that led to his becoming an American Superstar.
- 3. Discuss in depth the possible reasons that prevented Will Rogers from entering the political arena.
- 4. Compare and contrast Will Rogers to contemporary superstar political commentators such as Jon Stewart, Lewis Black, Stephen Colbert, Bill Maher, etc.
- 5. Recognize the similarities in Will Rogers' humorous style of political ribbing with contemporary satirists in print, television, film, internet, etc.
- 6. Develop skills in writing and presenting political commentary to an audience.

Or, if using this activity as a homework assignment, students may be instructed to conduct their own research on their assigned comedian. In addition to their research, students should be graded on their participation level and demonstrated knowledge of the material.
